Home Learning Option 1: Cafe Project



CONGRATULATIONS!



You are now the proud owner of a successful cafe.

You need to be able to sell at least 3 different food items such as a type of cake, a type of biscuit and a savoury item such as a bacon sandwich in your shop. You must also be able to sell a selection of hot and cold drinks.



Task 1

Choose a list of hot and cold drinks that you would like to sell in your cafe.

Make a list of these.

(EYFS children can draw their drinks and have a go at labelling them.)

Task 2

Ask your grown-up to help you with a Google Image search.

Look at lots of different cakes, biscuits and savoury foods you would find in a cafe.

Now that you have seen some goodies, make a list of your favourites.

Task 3

Design your menu.

Top Tip, don't make your menu too big. 3 food items and a few hot and cold drinks will be enough. You can choose more food items if you wish BUT you will go online shopping for all of the ingredients later and this could get tricky!

You could Google Menus to take a look at different layouts. Be creative but make it your own.

(Leave space for prices but don't add these just yet.)

Task 4

Take a look at your drink menu. Ask a grown up what thing you need to make these hot and cold drinks. (Y1 and Y2 may like to have a go first and a grown-up correct any mistakes.)

Make a list of the things you need on a Shopping List.

Task 5 and 6

Choose your cake, biscuit and savoury item. Research a recipe for these things. You could look in recipe books at home or use the computer to search on the internet.

KEEP THE RECIPES

Make a clear list of the things you need by looking on the ingredients sections of each recipe. (add to your shopping list)

Year 1 and Year 2, try and add up how much of the ingredients you will need in total. (EG. How much flour is needed for all the products? Sugar? Etc) Try writing down your calculations.

Task 7

You are almost set!

You cannot begin to buy your ingredients before setting up your cafe. For Task 7, you will need to come up with a name for your cafe and design a sign for it. Will you also include a logo? What signs will you need?

Toilets, queue here, table 1, table 2?

Next, write out your menu in neat (if you have not already done this) Some cafes have different food and drink menus whilst other include them on the same one in different sections.

Task 8

Go Shopping!

Ok, not really... But, go to your favourite supermarket's website. Asda, Tesco and Sainsburys have good online shopping facilities.

Using the shopping list you have created, go shopping. Add the items you need to your shopping cart and tick them off your list as you go. You may want to have a go yourself but it is okay if you want some help from your grown-up (as long as they don't do everything for you!) Remember to think about how many packs you will need of each item. Be sure to make a note of how much your shopping costs. (I really want to know who ends up spending the most money!)

Year 1 and Year 2, if you would like to set yourself a budget, feel free. You might find it fun to try and buy everything without going over your number. But, if the idea of shopping with no limits really floats your boat...

Go for it. Have fun!

Task 9

Now that you have an idea about how much all the ingredients cost, begin to add prices to your menu.

Think...

Is it reasonable to charge £5 for a cup of coffee, milkshake or a coke? Will people buy your food and drinks if they are too expensive? BUT Selling your things too cheaply will mean that you do not make any money. Ask your grown up to help you by checking your prices (You could also go onto different cafe's menus and see what they charge to get a good idea.)

Task 10

It's been fun designing your very own cafe and a first to experience online shopping at the supermarket.

There's just one thing left to do...

Have a go at making one of the food and drink items on your menu. If your weekly shop has already happened at home, don't worry, you can draw out your items onto paper. This would be so much fun too; a real chance to get your colouring pencils and felts out!

Task 11

Set up your cafe somewhere in your home. It can be in the garden, your dining room or just somewhere cosy and convenient in your home.

Finally...

Play Play Play

Who is coming to your cafe? Make sure you serve them politely. Give them what they ask for and remember to give them the bill at the end. If you are lucky, you might just get a tip!
